She was not satisfied with what she could see, she believed before seeing. Faith was her only guarantee and on this faith she built her hope. And from this faith her vocation was born.

The faith of a child who trusts because she feels loved. This experience transformed her and became a promise: ***“I will bring all the children to you so that they might learn to love you”.***

The miracle of faith is to believe that it is possible. It is a gratuitous love, one that believes before seeing.

I am small in stature and sickness has been with me since childhood. But to trust in Jesus is to know that what seems impossible is possible, that what is small can be transformed into greatness and fragility can become strength.

Marie Rivier encountered many social difficulties. She moved forward in spite of hatred, persecutions and the fear brought about by the French Revolution.


At that time in history, religious education was forbidden, convents were closed and congregations were denied freedom.

Marie Rivier was fascinated by the greatness of God and by the mission to which she felt she was called. There is no mission too great or project that cannot be realized when it is God who places it in your heart.

She saw herself as small, with fears, and she recognized her limitations. But she trusted and she felt that it was the hand of God that carried her.

Faced with so many impossibilities and so few means, ***“how can we doubt that it is God who brought us this far?”***

Recognizing our weakness is an act of courage that allows us to love with all of our heart. It is rooted in these sentiments that Marie Rivier gave her whole life without reserve.

On November 21, 1796, Marie Rivier, with her four companions, consecrated herself in secret because of the persecution suffered by religious congregations during the French Revolution. Thus, on this day, the Congregation of the Presentation of Mary was founded.

It was a very important and joyful day, the beginning of a new journey that would change the lives of many people.

The Congregation takes its name from the feast of the day. Marie Rivier saw a great resemblance with the deep meaning of the feast and her dream for the sisters.

A very ancient tradition recounts that when the Virgin Mary was a very young girl, her parents, St. Joachim and St. Anne, took her to the Temple in Jerusalem and presented her to God in thanksgiving for her birth and as an offering for her consecration.

Marie Rivier dreamt of living the joy of self-giving with a deep gratitude for life. She dreamt of serving God wholeheartedly and of loving to the fullest.

Generosity spreads life, because it is a gesture that touches the hearts of people. It connects us and enriches us by its gratuitousness.

To pray is to encounter God in a totally gratuitous way; it is to enjoy God's love. This experience transforms our whole life.

For these reasons, prayer was vital for Marie Rivier. It was the pillar of her life, from which her union with God was born. She felt the call to the desert, to silence, to leave everything aside and seek that space for intimacy, for encounter.

Silence taught her everything; in solitude she found her vocation.

And she considered that it was the best thing she could leave us:

"I leave you as an inheritance the spirit of prayer"
(Marie Rivier).


“Learn to converse with God in the depths of your heart” (Marie Rivier).

To be humble is to act with authenticity, to be close to others, to know how to listen, to connect with people. To be supportive and to be sincere is to be committed to what we do with honesty and simplicity.

Marie Rivier tells us that the more humble we are in what we do, the more good we will do, because only from humility can unity, encounter and life, in capital letters emerge. Humility reminds us that we can do nothing alone.

To live fraternity is to be a family beyond blood ties, it is to feel that we are brothers and sisters and to care for one another out of a deep love. This is everyone's task, but it is also the responsibility of each one of us.

Sharing multiplies in all directions and not only on the material level.


We live in a time when we have everything and all types of possibilities are within our reach, yet we live in scarcity because nothing is enough for us.

Everywhere, in the most hidden corner, in a sad look, in a heart of stone, in tired hands, she multiplied herself to speak about Jesus and bring his love, to bring light and hope to all those who did not know him yet.

She wanted to share all that she had seen and heard since she was a little girl, to recount what the Lord had done with her, to bring this life to all, so that all might live.

Commitment to the poor marked the life of Marie Rivier and she went so far as to say that if at any time the Congregation forgot about them, she would prefer that it disappear.

Caring for the needs of people was her priority. Giving every person what they needed meant stopping, listening and looking them in the eye.

Being attentive to the desires and hopes of others, to their fears and their needs makes us all richer because it unites us beyond the material things that we can share.

Marie Rivier never refused to help anyone, because when you look into the heart, it is difficult to turn your face away.


